Continuing Education

It is that time of year to not only get some modeling accomplished, but it is also a prime time to learn more about our hobby. Division meets/activities are currently being held, the region's convention will soon be here, train shows are in abundance and, due to the weather, it's often a good time to stay indoors and do some reading or watch instructional videos. All of the above listed activities can provide the railroad modeler ways to increase their knowledge of railroads and modeling.

How do you do that? If the event you are attending, or planning to attend, offers clinics - find a clinic with a subject that interests you and make sure you are in the audience. Listen and take notes or make sure you have a copy of the clinician's handout for later study. If you are anything like me, unless you take notes, you won't remember the important points. Train shows often include portable, modular layouts for viewing. Study what has been accomplished on those modules. Quite often you will see a model building, piece of rolling stock, or track arrangement that interests you. Ask a member of the layout group about it to learn the particulars. Don't be afraid to ask, but also remember to thank the modeler for bringing their layout to the show for all to see. Yesterday I helped staff the Central Indiana Division's booth at the Great Train Show in Indianapolis. A fair amount of the day was spent answering questions from the show attendees. If you have modeling questions, seek out your NMRA/Division's booth and talk to the modelers who are staffing the booth. If we can't immediately answer your question, we will ask others and get the information to you.

Why would you want to do that? The phrase "knowledge is power" is attributed to Francis Bacon.

So how does that help us? If we can increase our knowledge of a subject through education, we also increase our power to overcome the difficulties associated with that subject. Learning more about the subject allows us to more easily solve problems, thus increasing our



enjoyment by decreasing our frustrations. Since model railroading is (supposed to be) fun, anything we can do to decrease frustrations must be good. Right? Right! Learning new techniques for kit building, kitbashing, or scratchbuilding will allow you to become a better modeler. Better modeler = better models. Learning more about electronics will allow you to keep from zapping LEDs or letting the magic smoke out of DCC decoders. Both are good things.

How can we help? The following is an excerpt from the Midwest Region Constitution: The purposes of the Region, as set forth in its Articles of Incorporation, are to promote, stimulate, foster, and encourage by all manner and means the art and craft of model railroading and the preservation of the history, science, and technology thereof. So education is a basic reason for our organization. One of the ideas the Region is currently developing is how can we help those who have questions about electricity and electronics. Education Coordinator Eric Peterson and I were discussing this yesterday and are in the process of formulating a pathway to increase modelers' knowledge of electronics. Those of you with questions can help us by sending those questions to us. That will allow us to understand what people want to learn about. Send them to me at: sastudley@comcast.net

Pandemic

We are living in a very strange time in history. Non-essential businesses are closed; restaurants are open for carry-out or drive-through service only. There are to be no gatherings of large groups of people, and even then, we need to worry about "social distancing". I suspect many of our local hobby shops are also closed. We are told to stay at home and shelter-in-place. These restrictions started in March and are mostly still in effect. Indiana has begun the process to open up again, but the county in which I live still retains the restrictions.

The restrictions that were put in place for Illinois caused the Board to reconsider holding our Midwest Regional convention. We had already heard from some members who were not going to attend based on their personal health considerations. And let's face it; most of us are in the at-risk group whose age is greater than 60 yrs. In late March, with restrictions in place in Illinois, the Peoria Rocket 2020 convention committee and the MWR Executive Board decided to consider postponing the convention. After checking with the hotel for other possible dates and learning that our best choice would be just after Trainfest and just prior to Thanksgiving, we decided to cancel. At that time, NMRA was still planning to hold the National Convention and National Train Show in St. Louis. After running into countless difficulties trying to schedule planning meetings and having layout owners rethink having large numbers of people trekking through their houses, the Gateway 2020 committee and the NMRA decided to cancel the National Convention.

Unfortunately, by cancelling Peoria Rocket 2020 all the work that had been accomplished by the two host Divisions – Illinois Valley and Illinois

Terminal – has all been for naught. We appreciate their labors in planning for the MWR regional convention and are very sorry that it wasn't to be. Thanks also to all the clinicians, layout owners, and volunteers who were ready to help; and those who had already signed up to attend. Special thanks go to Mike Shockley and the convention committee for the countless hours spent getting ready for the Rocket.

We have seen that most (all?) division in-person meetings have been cancelled for the rest of the spring. We await a better situation for the fall modeling season. Hopefully, the health crisis will have calmed down by then and we can get back to what some health officials have named the "new normal". In the meantime, we have learned to utilize video-conferencing applications to allow us to still have some semblance of getting together to discuss model railroading. The MWR Board will have their spring meeting via video-conferencing in late May. Notifications for the Board and the MWR members' annual meetings will be sent by email.

I was able to attend 17 of the 25 (have to get some sleep) hours of clinics of the first NMRA-X virtual convention. This was a Facebook, live video-conference that included 25 hours of internationally presented clinics. The second of these will be held on May 16. Check NMRA-X on Facebook to see if there will be other events. I think there will be another one in mid-June. For further information, check NMRA-X on Facebook or the NMRA website.

Since we are hoping for better conditions in the future, we can also start making plans to attend the 2021 MWR convention in the Rockford, IL area: Rockford Railroad Convention. The RRVD convention committee is in the early planning stages for the convention. As information becomes available, it will be posted on the MWR website. Pandemic II

Although the threat of COVID-19 remains with us, we are seeing a lessening of the restrictions that had been in place at the time of the last writing. More businesses are now open, but with that come continued restrictions regarding masks and social distancing. Hopefully we will soon be able to attend conventions and other model railroad events once again in-person. Until that time, we are thankful that there are video conferencing apps that allow us to meet and interact virtually. I trust you have been able to put these apps to good use by attending meetings, clinics, and other model railroading virtual events. Zoom is a prime example of one of these programs.

Zoom may be a four-letter word, but it's a good word, not a bad one. The program allows a group member to share a presentation with others in the group. And, similar to an in-person clinic, questions may be asked and answers received. During the viewing, questions may be asked either orally, for an immediate answer, or typed into a chat frame, for an answer after the presentation. If Zoom, or other similar programs, weren't readily available and fairly easy to use we'd have a much harder time experiencing the educational and social aspects of our hobby.

I'm very happy these virtual meetings are available. I've been able to attend several meetings of the Central Indiana Division's (CID) Track Talk and a few of Michiana Division's monthly meetings. After the cancellations of the MWR 2020 Regional and the 2020 NMRA National Conventions, being unable to attend clinics was causing withdrawal symptoms. Fortunately, clinics have been made available virtually and have been proven to be easy to attend. I hope

you, too, have been taking advantage of events that might be sponsored by your division. Right now, without in-person meetings, virtual meetings are providing us with continued model railroad educational opportunities. As of this writing, for the rest of 2020, it appears that some of the MWR divisions will continue to hold virtual meetings in place of in-person meetings and some divisions will hold both. If you are concerned about meeting with others, you can still attend virtually and not miss out on the presentations.

Gordie Robinson and his world-wide crew have offered day-long meetings with hour-long clinics under the NMRAx title. Clinicians for these events are from everywhere. We have had presenters from Australia, New Zealand, UK, United States, and Canada. The streaming event is available on Facebook (you do not need to have a Facebook account to view the event) and on YouTube. Information about these meetings is available on the NMRA website. The events are recorded in 5 – 6 hour blocks and stored for viewing on YouTube a few days after the meeting. Later, the individual clinics are separated from these blocks and placed on the NMRA YouTube channel. Not only have there been several NMRAx meetings, there has also been a daylong event, SERx, sponsored by the Southeastern Region and a five-day event, Gatewayx, sponsored by the Gateway Division that took place during the dates scheduled for the National Convention.

Remember, the 2021 MWR convention, The Rockford Railroad Convention, will be held in Rockford, IL Thursday, May 20th through Sunday, May 23rd, 2021. The RRVD convention committee has the major events set and they continue to plan for the convention. As information becomes available, it will be posted on the MWR website. Click on the Conventions tab at the top of the page. Mark your calendars - and cross your fingers that the virus leaves us alone next May.

I am developing the impression that increased communications and interactions between the divisions will be needed to cope with the primary challenge all volunteer based groups are dealing with right now: membership.

I am developing the impression that the region might be able to help with the common services each division has to create each time they put on a Regional Convention. Things like registration, ticket sales, printing programs, and processing credit cards. I would like to make it easier for a division to put on a convention. I would like to let the convention committee focus more on the unique content of their conven-

tion and less on the activities common to all conventions.

But I am in my listen and learn mode. So all grand action plans are on hold until the MWR BOD and Division leadership agrees that we should act on an objective as a team.

What do I model?

I model the southern branch of the Wisconsin and Southern in N scale. It runs right through the town I live in. Prototype research is pretty easy for me compared to something like Colorado narrow gauge. I was attracted to WSOR because it is a short line that directly interacts with the customers. Almost every train will spot or pick up cars at a customer site. It is dark territory controlled by track warrants which are issued by radio to the crews. The crews are responsible for the operation of all the mainline turnouts. If you like switching, it is a great choice for a prototype. If you want to run passenger trains or unit trains or high priority freight trains, it is not a good choice. I really like switching. I've described my layout as a set of interconnected switching puzzles.

Ten years ago, when I was selecting my DCC system, I really liked the NCE throttles compared to the other throttles. My operational model is simple. I do not need to use any of the advanced features of DCC. With dark territory and no centralized control of turnouts, all I need to do is drive trains. My strong preference for the NCE throttles drove the decision. If I was making the decision today, I might go with a Wi-Fi throttle system.

I use Atlas Code 55 track. I think is it the bestlooking N scale track system available. You don't get into N scale if you have a strong desire to use hand laid track with custom built turnouts. About 80% of the layout is flex track. Despite what I have heard over the internet, I have found the Atlas Code 55 track system to be very reliable.

I use JMRI Operations Pro to generate the switch lists for operations. It is a program with a lot of "character". It is not for the faint of heart. But the price is right. It beats all heck out of writing my own program.

Regional Topics

One of my goals in my first few months as the MWR President is to spend some time with of each of the divisions. It could be by Zoom or it could be in person. Zoom visits have been the most common visit so far. I think I have spent some time with about

half the divisions. It has been a great experience. If you copy me on an invite for a divisional Zoom meeting, I will try to drop in. Same goes for face-to-face meetings or special events like train shows. The travel time can be an issue. Wisconsin is not exactly the center of the region.

There is no formal job training program for new region presidents. The closest thing I have found is the annual meeting of the Regional Advisory Committee, ominously known as the RAC. The RAC is the communications channel between the Regions and the National NMRA BOD. This spring I got to sit in on the meeting. All 10 hours of it. I learned a number of interesting things. Like the average age of an NMRA member is 68. Like only about 10% of the NMRA members use the NMRA web site. The most important thing I learned is that no matter what challenge a division is facing, there probably are a lot of other divisions with the same challenge. All of us are pretty much in the same boat these days. This is not necessarily a bad thing. Having 1000 people spread over many divisions working on a solution to a problem raises the odds that a solution will be found. The trick is to share a solution between divisions once one of them finds it. In my old job this was called sharing of best practices.

Not surprisingly, the biggest issue that came up during the RAC sessions was NMRA membership. NMRA membership has been declining for years. The decline in membership accelerated under the Covid restrictions. We were not the only volunteer group facing this challenge prior to Covid. We were not the only volunteer group to see an accelerated loss of membership under Covid. I believe the return to face-to-face meetings is the first step to increasing our membership. More on this topic later.

Fall MWR BOD meeting and the Annual Meeting of the Membership.

We had planned to hold the Fall MWR Board of Directors meeting and the Annual Meeting of the Membership at Trainfest 2021 in Milwaukee on November 14th. But Trainfest 2021 has been canceled. The Rock River Valley Division stepped up and volunteered to host the meetings. The plan is to hold both meetings in Rockford Illinois on November 14th. The BOD meeting will be held from 9 AM to Noon at the Machine Shed Restaurant, 7475 E State St, Rockford.

The Annual Meeting of the Membership will be

held at 1 PM as part of the RRVD regular monthly meeting at the Lutheran Church of the Good Shepherd, 1829 N. Rockton Ave, Rockford. There is still a chance that the Covid situation will mess up our plans to get back to face to face meetings, so stay tuned.

President's Report Bob McGeever President, MWR

Report to the MWR members regards the WISE Division.

The following is a rather dry and not very exciting read. But I believe it is very important that all members of the MWR understand the status of the WISE Division.

At my very first Midwest Region BOD meeting as the new MWR President I received a report from the Superintendent of the WISE division that made it clear that the division was in big trouble. He raised the possibility that the division might have to dissolve if conditions did not improve. I began sitting in on WISE BOD meetings. It was clear to me that the trouble the WISE was experiencing was the result of the burden of being the host of Trainfest.

In late October that burden broke the WISE executive committee. The Paymaster, Asst Super and Super announced their intentions to resign their positions. At a special meeting of the BOD, dissolving of the division and merger with the SCWD was brought up. The intentions of the Super, Asst Super and Treasurer to resign were affirmed. On October 27th I received an email from the Chief Clerk with the subject line "Now what?" Now what indeed.

I started reading the WISE and MWR bylaws to see if a situation like this was covered. Strangely, it wasn't, but I did find a couple of possible paths through the crisis.

As of October 27th, no official resignations had occurred. Statements of intentions on Facebook and the like don't count as resignations. Nobody had submitted a letter of resignation to the BOD and the BOD had not acted on any such letters. The WISE BOD still existed and could deal with all this at their Nov 10th BOD meeting. I talked to the Treasurer as the assets of the WISE division needed to be protected. I asked him to postpone his resignation until we could find a way through the rest of the crisis. He agreed to stay on. Now we had a little time to figure out some options.

The first option was to dissolve the WISE. I really wanted to avoid this. The second option was for other members of the WISE BOD to volunteer to become the new Super and Asst Super. This was my preferred option, but it didn't happen. The third option was for the division to become inactive under Article 5

Section 8 of the MWR bylaws. As far as I know, this had never happened before. But it would provide a path to rebuild the WISE division. They would be placing the division in a form of receivership. This was the option the WISE BOD chose.

At their Nov 10th meeting, the WISE BOD was unable to find replacements for the Super and Asst Super. They voted to declare the division inactive under Article 5 Section 8 of the MWR bylaws.

At the Nov 14th meeting of the MWR BOD, a motion was passed with the following clauses: 1) The Midwest Region BOD accept the motion of the WISE BOD and declare that the WISE division is inactive under Article 5 Section 8 of the MWR bylaws. 2) The MWR BOD accepts the recommendation of the MWR President to create a WISE division Executive Committee and appoint, under the authority of Article 5 Section 8 of the MWR bylaws, Burnell Breaker as Superintendent, Robert Niedermann as Assistant Superintendent, Dennis Janssen as Paymaster, and David Rohr as Chief Clerk. All four have agreed to serve in these interim positions. They are chartered to develop a plan to reactivate the division, or failing that, a proposal to dissolve the division. They are given full control over the WISE division and its assets. They will report to the MWR Executive Committee on a monthly basis the status of the division.

- 3) All portions of the WISE Constitution and Bylaws that conflict with this grant of authority are suspended until such time that MWR BOD approves a reactivation plan for the WISE division.
- 4) The MWR BOD grants the Executive Committee the authority to decide issues and take actions as needed to support the work of the interim WISE Division Executive Committee.

In short, we are attempting to perform a power up reset on the WISE division. Any help the region members can give Burnell, Bob, Dennis and David would be greatly appreciated. The future of the WISE division has been entrusted to them.

Several small topics to cover this time around.

Trainfest Returns

Trainfest was held in Milwaukee this November. For those of you who live in the southern half of the Midwest Region, this may not be big news. But for those of us who live "up nort", it is a big deal. The show was cancelled in 2020 and 2021 due to the Covid epidemic. This year the show was produced by Kalmbach Media and Great American Train Shows under license from the WISE division. The WISE and SCWD divisions had booths at the show. While the show was smaller than in the past, there was a nice mix of layouts, vendors, and manufacturers on the show floor. Final numbers are not in at the time I am writing this, but the attendance seems to have been pretty good. Sunday attendance was reported to be very strong. I saw a nice mix of hobbyists and families in attendance. At this time, the plan for the 2023 show is for it to be produced by Kalmbach Media and Great American Train Shows under license from the WISE division.

NMRA Interchange

The Regional Advisory Committee met by video conference using Zoom on November 5th. One of the topics discussed was the soon to be released NMRA Interchange. It is being built on technology from an outfit called Discord.com. If you are really curious, you can check it out on the Discord web site. The NMRA Interchange is supposed to start coming online around Thanksgiving. I have high hopes for the Interchange. If it works as described, it will be an integrated communication tool for divisional, regional, and national activities.

Other Types of Modelers

For the past several years, I have been noticing other types of modelers. Folks who are military modelers, airplane modelers, automobile modelers and ship modelers. I have met a guy who models large, multi-story construction cranes in N scale. He builds all the truss work by hand. Last month I met a ship modeler at a maker-fest who models WW2 era destroyers and destroyer escorts. His destroyer hull is about five feet long. It is not supposed to flex. I have seen some outstanding diorama work at plastic modeler's conventions. The military modelers have developed an incredible array of weathering techniques and supplies that we can use in model railroading. My favorite static grass applicator is made by an outfit called War World Scenics. Not a big name in the model railroad world.

I'm starting to think us model railroaders have become a bit in-grown when it comes to modeling techniques. We should be spending more time with other kinds of modelers and learning how they solve some of the same modeling challenges we face. And we might attract some of them to model railroading.

Regional Membership

In my last report, I mentioned we were going to look into the listing of Life Members in the MWR. I was concerned that we were carrying a large number of Life Members on the roster that were no longer with us. This had come up at some sessions at the Gateway 2022 convention. Neither the regions nor the mothership seem to have a formal procedure for maintaining the Life Members lists. Based on my initial pass through the numbers, I said either model railroading has a positive effect on life expectancy, or we have a lot of passed members on the list. To my great surprise, it appears that model railroading has a positive impact on life expectancy. The division supers found that most of the members on the roster are still with us and in many cases active in their division.

FYI, the average member of the MWR is 72 years old and has been a member of the NMRA for 23.2 years. In 2021 we had 171 regional members who had been NMRA members for less than four years. In 2022, that number had grown to 189. Food for thought.

Mid West Region NMRA – Summer 2023

President's Report Bob McGeever President, MWR

As I was reviewing the listing of BOD members, Division leaders and MWR Committee chairs in preparation for the spring meeting of the Midwest Region Board of Directors, I noticed the MWR is set up for a lot of leadership changes in the next few years.

The Executive Committee:

The Executive Committee is the President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer and Past President. The Executive Committee is responsible for the governance and administration of the region between the meetings of the BOD. The President also serves as the region's representative on the Regional Advisory Council. The RAC is the communication channel between the regional BODs and the national BOD.

The President and Vice President are term limited. They are both in their second and final term which will end at the Spring 2025 Regional BOD meeting. These are elected positions.

The current Secretary and Treasurer have told me they are planning to resign effective the 2025 Spring BOD meeting. These are appointed positions. I will be replacing the current Past President at the Spring 2025 BOD meeting.

A clean sweep of all five positions!

I don't want to sound cynical, but I am not too worried about the elected positions. We have not had a lot of trouble filling them. I am concerned about the appointed positions of Secretary and Treasurer. Both of them are "skilled" positions that require some ramp up time. It would be good to identify the replacements in time to provide real cross training. I know from personal experience we have not been able to do that for the Secretary position and suspect the last Treasurer transition did not have extensive training time.

Committee Chairs:

The Financial Review Chair is vacant. This committee is our internal audit function. I would like to

see it filled in coordination with the appointment of the new Treasurer. The Treasurer and the Financial Review committee must work as a team. Or, since we have not been using this committee for some time, we may want to eliminate it.

The Clinic Clearing House Chair is vacant. This committee is supposed to be an interchange for clinics that can be made available to the divisions. Now that a clinician can "Zoom in" to a meeting, the pool of potential clinicians is huge. Divisions with a good source of clinics can share the wealth with the rest of the region by supporting this interchange.

The Education Coordinator position is vacant. Recently, this position has been held by the Clinic Clearing House Chair. This position is not listed in our bylaws. The Education Coordinator would develop or coordinate multi-session programs that would be made available to the divisions. Since it is intertwined with the Clinic Clearing House committee, it may be time to assign these duties to that committee.

The Youth Fund Chair is vacant. The MWR has a fund to support youth activities. A division can apply for funds to promote the interest and participation of youth in our hobby. Youth Groups, Rail Schools and "Make & Take" sessions could be supported by this fund. Covid shut down most of this activity. Some divisions are restarting their youth groups and rail schools, so it is time to fill this position.

The Membership Chair will be vacant by June 2025. We have time to train the new chair.

The Convention Chair, the region Photographer, the Photo Contest Chair and Model Contest Chair positions are all vacant. Based on our bylaws, these positions are all intertwined in the Regional Convention process. We need to get our convention process rebuilt. I suspect it will be different from the way we used to do things. For example, most of our divisions do not have the financial ability to pay all the up-front costs associated with a convention so the Region will have to be more involved in the finances. I did not find the Photographer listed in the bylaws. There is a team based in the Michiana Division working on the next convention. Every aspect of what a convention should be and how it will be run is on the table. I will not be looking to fill these positions until we have a working definition of what our convention process will be.


stand that the next few years will have their own challenges. Our job is to find solutions.
